Operation Talwar (Operation Sword) was the **Indian Navy’s strategic naval operation** during the **Kargil War of 1999**. It was launched to support India’s military campaign by putting pressure on Pakistan through **naval dominance in the Arabian Sea**. While the Indian Army fought on land and the Indian Air Force conducted air operations under **Operation Safed Sagar**, the Indian Navy carried out **Operation Talwar** to restrict Pakistan’s maritime trade and oil supplies.

Operation Talwar

Operation Talwar was launched by the **Indian Navy** during the Kargil conflict in **May 1999**. The operation aimed to block Pakistan’s sea routes, disrupt its trade, and reduce its ability to import essential supplies, especially crude oil.

Operation Talwar Background

During the Kargil War, Pakistan had infiltrated Indian territory in the Kargil sector. While the Indian Army and Air Force launched military operations on land and in the air, the Indian Navy was assigned the task of exerting pressure at sea.

To achieve this, the Indian Navy launched **Operation Talwar**, combining its **Eastern Fleet and Western Fleet** to dominate the Arabian Sea and threaten Pakistan's maritime trade.

Operation Talwar Objectives

The main objectives of Operation Talwar were:

- To block Pakistan's important sea routes in the Arabian Sea.
- To restrict Pakistan's maritime trade.
- To reduce Pakistan's crude oil and fuel imports.
- To increase military and economic pressure during the **Kargil War**.
- To support the Indian Army and Air Force through naval superiority.

How Operation Talwar Was Carried Out?

- The **Eastern Fleet** and **Western Fleet** were brought together for coordinated operations.
- Indian warships were deployed in the **Arabian Sea** near Pakistan's coastline.

- Indian Navy submarines were positioned around the **Karachi coast** to monitor and deter enemy movement.
- Naval exercises and patrols demonstrated India's readiness to escalate if required.
- The strong naval presence effectively threatened Pakistan's shipping and supply lines.

- Pakistan's maritime trade routes came under significant pressure.
- The threat to oil imports created economic and military concerns for Pakistan.
