

Festivals of Bihar, List, Significance & Cultural Importance

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Bihar is a land of **rich cultural traditions** and **vibrant celebrations**. Festivals here reflect the **deep faith**, **history**, and **social harmony** of its people. They are often connected with **nature**, **seasons**, and **religious beliefs**, and are celebrated with great **devotion** and **enthusiasm**. These festivals not only bring people together but also showcase the **unique cultural identity** and **heritage** of the state. Festivals of Bihar are discussed in detail in this article.

Major Festivals of Bihar

The **major festivals of Bihar** reflect the state's **rich cultural heritage**, **religious traditions**, and **seasonal diversity**. These festivals are celebrated with great **devotion** and **enthusiasm**, bringing people together and strengthening **social harmony**. Some of the most important festivals are discussed below, highlighting their **significance** and **unique features**.

1. Chhath Puja

- **Chhath Puja** is a major Hindu festival dedicated to the **Sun God (Surya)** and **Chhathi Maiya**, mainly celebrated in **Bihar** with great faith and devotion.
- It is observed during **Kartik Shukla Paksha** (October-November), just after Diwali, and marks a time of **seasonal change and gratitude towards nature**.
- The festival lasts for **four days** and is known for its **strict rituals**, including a **36-hour fast without food and water**, showing strong discipline and purity.
- A unique feature of this festival is that there is **no idol worship**, as devotees directly pray to the **Sun and natural elements** while standing in rivers or water bodies.
- **Four Days of Rituals**
 - **Nahay-Khaay:** Devotees take a **holy bath**, bring clean water home, and eat **pure vegetarian food** while maintaining cleanliness.
 - **Kharna:** A **day-long fast** is observed and broken in the evening with **kheer**, after which the **36-hour fast begins**.
 - **Sandhya Arghya:** Devotees gather at **riverbanks** to offer prayers to the **setting Sun** with traditional offerings in bamboo baskets.
 - **Usha Arghya:** The final prayer is offered to the **rising Sun**, and the fast ends with **Prasad distribution** among family and community.
- **Historical and Mythological Significance**
 - Chhath Puja is considered an **ancient form of nature worship**, reflecting early human respect for **natural forces** like the Sun, which sustains life on Earth.
 - In the **Mahabharata**, **Karna**, the son of **Surya**, is believed to have performed rituals to worship the Sun, while **Draupadi** observed this fast for **strength and restoration of her kingdom**.
 - In the **Ramayana**, it is believed that **Lord Ram and Goddess Sita** performed **Sun worship** after returning to **Ayodhya**, adding to its **religious importance**.

2. Sonapur Cattle Fair

- The **Sonapur Cattle Fair**, also known as the **Harihar Kshetra Mela**, is one of the **largest livestock fairs in Asia**, held annually in **Sonapur (Bihar)** at the sacred **confluence of the Ganga and Gandak rivers**, making it both a **commercial** and **religious gathering**.
- The fair begins on the auspicious occasion of **Kartik Purnima** (full moon of Kartik month, around **November**) and continues for nearly a **month**, attracting large numbers of **traders, pilgrims, and tourists** from different parts of India and beyond.
- It has been popular since **ancient times** as a major center for **livestock trading**, where animals like **horses, cattle, birds**, and historically even **elephants** were bought and sold, giving it the identity of a traditional '**Pashu Mela**'.
- **Historical Significance**
 - The fair has deep **historical roots**, and it is believed that even **Chandragupta Maurya** used this place to purchase **horses and elephants**, highlighting its importance in **ancient military and trade networks**.
 - Historical accounts suggest that **traders from Central Asia** visited this fair, making it an important hub of **international trade** in earlier times, especially for **war elephants**.

- Prominent historical figures such as **Emperor Akbar**, **Veer Kunwar Singh**, and even **Robert Clive** (who built a horse stable in 1803) are associated with this fair, showing its continued importance across different periods.
- The fair was originally held in **Hajipur** but was later shifted to **Sonepur** during the reign of **Mughal Emperor Aurangzeb**, giving it its present location.

3. Makar-Sankranti

- **Makar Sankranti** is a major **pan-India harvest festival** and is known for its **seasonal importance**, **agricultural significance**, and **cultural diversity** across different regions
- Unlike most Indian festivals that follow the **lunar calendar**, Makar Sankranti is based on the **solar cycle**, which is why it falls on almost the **same date every year**, making it unique among Hindu festivals
- The festival marks the time when the **Sun changes its direction** and begins its **northward movement (Uttarayan)**, entering the **Makara (Capricorn) zodiac sign**, which is considered highly **auspicious**
- It also indicates a **change in season**, as the days gradually become **longer and warmer**, symbolizing the **end of winter** and a shift away from a period of **inactivity** towards **growth and energy**
- Makar Sankranti is mainly a **harvest festival**, marking the **end of the winter crop season** and the beginning of a **new agricultural cycle**, especially important for farmers
- It is a time to express **gratitude towards nature**, the **Sun**, and agricultural resources for providing a successful harvest and sustaining life
- The festival is celebrated in different parts of India with **different names and customs**, reflecting the country's **cultural diversity**.
 - In **Tamil Nadu**, it is celebrated as **Pongal**, a **four-day festival**
 - In **Punjab**, it is known as **Lohri**, marked by **bonfires**, **folk songs**
 - In **Assam**, it is celebrated as **Magh Bihu**
 - In **Bihar**, it is often called **Khichdi**
 - In states like **Gujarat and Rajasthan**, the festival is famous for **kite flying**
- The festival encourages values like **sharing, gratitude, and community bonding**, bringing people closer and strengthening **social relationships**

4. Pitrapaksha Mela

- The **Pitru Paksha Mela** is a **world-famous religious event** held in **Gaya (Bihar)**, where lakhs of **devotees from India and abroad** gather to perform **Pind Daan** and **Tarpan** for the **peace and salvation of their ancestors' souls**
- It is observed for about **16 days during Ashwin Krishna Paksha** (from **Bhadrapada Purnima to Ashwin Amavasya/Mahalaya**), a period considered highly **sacred for Shraddha rituals** in **Hindu tradition**
- The main ritual, **Pind Daan**, is believed to grant **moksha (liberation)** to ancestors from the **cycle of birth and death**, making **Gaya** one of the most **important pilgrimage sites** for ancestral worship
- Key ritual locations include the **Vishnupad Temple**, the banks of the **Phalgu River**, **Pretshila**, **Sita Kund**, and other sites, with around **48 designated altars** where rituals are performed under the guidance of **priests**

- According to beliefs, **Lord Rama** performed **Pind Daan** here for his father **Dasharatha**, and **Goddess Sita** also offered rituals on the **Phalgu River**, giving rise to traditions like **Sita Pind Daan**
- During this period, the entire city is filled with **devotion and spiritual energy**, as large numbers of **pilgrims and priests** participate together in rituals and prayers

5. Rajgir Mahotsav

- The **Rajgir Festival** is a popular **cultural event** that highlights the **history, religion, art, and heritage** of **Rajgir and Nalanda**
- It started in **1986** and is celebrated every year in **December**, gaining recognition at the **state, national, and international levels**
- This is a **three-day festival** organised by the **Tourism Department, Art and Culture Department**, and the **Nalanda district administration** of Bihar
- The main venue is the **Rajgir Convention Centre (RICC)** and its surrounding areas, where various events are held
- The festival includes **classical music and dance performances, folk arts, cultural programs, food fairs, and heritage exhibitions**
- Many **famous artists, singers, and dancers** from across India and abroad perform live, making the festival lively and engaging
- Over time, the festival has combined **traditional and modern elements**, helping to promote **Rajgir and Nalanda as major tourist destinations**

6. Bihula

- The **Bihula Mahotsav**, also known as **Bihula-Bishari Puja**, is an important **cultural and religious festival** mainly celebrated in the **Bhagalpur district of Bihar**
- It is observed every year in **August**, where people worship **Goddess Manasa (the serpent goddess)** for the **safety and well-being of their families**
- The festival is based on the **folk story of Bihula and Lakhindar**, which highlights **true love, devotion, and determination**
- According to the legend, **Bihula's strong faith and efforts brought her husband back to life** after he died from a snake bite
- A major attraction of the festival is **Manjusha art**, a traditional art form with **snake designs and mythological stories**
- The celebration includes **local fairs, folk songs, traditional dances, and dramatic performances** based on the story of Bihula
- Special **rituals and prayers** are performed by priests and devotees, mainly to **seek protection from snake bites** and blessings for children

7. Buddha Jayanti

- **Buddha Jayanti**, also known as **Buddha Purnima** or **Vesak**, is the most important **festival for Buddhists in Bihar**

- It marks the **birth, enlightenment, and death (nirvana)** of **Lord Buddha**, making it a very **sacred occasion**
- The festival is celebrated on the **full moon day of the Vaisakha month** (usually in **April or May**)
- In **Bihar**, the main celebrations take place in **Bodh Gaya**, where **Lord Buddha attained enlightenment** under the **Bodhi Tree**
- The **Mahabodhi Temple Complex in Bihar** becomes the center of activities, attracting **devotees from across India and around the world**
- A major highlight is a **religious procession (Dhamma Yatra)** along with **prayers, meditation, and chanting**
- Devotees offer **flowers, robes, candles, and kheer (sweet dish)** as a sign of **respect and devotion**
- Overall, the festival in **Bihar** spreads the message of **peace, wisdom, and compassion**, which are the core teachings of Buddha

8. Jivitputrika

- **Jivitputrika**, also called **Jitiya Vrat**, is an important **festival in Bihar**, especially celebrated by **mothers**
- It is observed for the **health, long life, and prosperity of their children**
- The festival lasts for **three days**, each with its own significance
- **Day 1 (Nahai-Khai):** Mothers take a **holy bath** and eat a **proper meal** to prepare for the fast
- **Day 2 (Fasting Day):** Mothers observe a **strict fast**, often without food and water, showing their **deep love and dedication**
- **Day 3 (Paaran):** The fast is **ended with a meal**, marking the completion of the ritual
- The festival is linked to the **story of King Jimutavahana**, who is remembered for his **selfless sacrifice and kindness**

9. Madhushravani

- **Madhushravani** is a **traditional festival of Bihar**, mainly celebrated by **newly married women** in the **Mithila region**
- It takes place during the **monsoon month of Sawan** and lasts for about **13-15 days**
- The festival focuses on **love in marriage, husband's long life**, and **harmony with nature**
- Newlywed women usually celebrate it at their **parents' home**, where they follow rituals with **family support and guidance**
- They worship **Lord Shiva, Goddess Parvati, serpent deities (Nagas), and Navagrahas**, offering **fruits, sweets, and flowers**
- Women collect **seasonal flowers and leaves** in baskets and take part in **traditional songs and prayers**
- Elder women share **mythological and folk stories**, helping pass on **traditions and cultural values**
- On the final day, a traditional ritual is performed to show the bride's **patience and devotion**
- The festival reflects the **cultural richness of Bihar** and highlights **marital bonding, faith, and tradition**

Role of Festivals in Preserving Bihar's Art, Culture, and Traditions

- Festivals like **Chhath Puja** and **Makar Sankranti** help preserve **ancient rituals, seasonal practices, and traditional beliefs**, keeping Bihar's cultural roots strong and meaningful even in modern times
