Major Festivals of Meghalaya

- The dance performances include **unmarried girls and male members**, all dressed in **rich traditional attire**, showcasing elegance and cultural pride.
- Overall, the festival reflects **faith, cultural identity, and community unity**, while also keeping ancient Khasi traditions alive.

2. Umsan Nongkharai Festival

- **Umsan Nongkharai** is a religious festival of the **Khasi community**, usually celebrated in **April or May**.
- It is dedicated to **Lei Shyllong**, the main deity of the Khasi religion, after whom **Shillong city and its peak** are named.
- The rituals begin at **midnight with prayers and offerings**, including **animal sacrifice**, as a mark of devotion.
- Traditional **musical instruments like drums and flutes** are played while men perform **ritual dances that continue till dawn**.
- The festival continues for **five days**, with each day having **specific prayers and themes**.
- People pray for a **good harvest, protection from natural calamities**, and also perform **fertility-related rituals**.
- The final day attracts **large gatherings**, making it both a **spiritual and social celebration**.

3. Chad Sukra Festival

- **Chad Sukra** is an important **sowing festival of the Pnar (Jaintia) tribe**, linked closely with agriculture.
- It is celebrated before the **beginning of the farming season**, as people seek blessings for a **successful harvest**.
- The festival holds special importance in the **Niamtre religion**, the traditional belief system of the Pnar community.
- Rituals and prayers are performed to ensure **fertility of land and prosperity** in the coming year.
- People dress in their **best traditional clothes**, and various **folk dances and cultural performances** take place.
- It gives visitors a chance to experience the **traditional lifestyle and cultural richness** of the Jaintia community.

4. Laho Dance Festival

- The **Laho Dance** is a lively and colourful cultural celebration of the **Jaintia (Pnar) tribe**.

- It involves **men and women dancing together**, where a woman is placed between two men, and they **link arms and move in rhythm**.
- The dance is unique because it is often accompanied by a **narrator who recites humorous and spontaneous verses**, adding entertainment.
- It is also known as the **Chipiah Dance** and is performed during **community gatherings and festivals**.
- The festival highlights the spirit of **joy, unity, and social bonding** within the community.
- It reflects the **fun-loving and expressive nature** of the people of Meghalaya.

5. Shad Suk Mynsiem Festival

- **Shad Suk Mynsiem**, meaning the **“Dance of Peaceful Hearts,”** is an important festival of the **Khasi tribe**.
- It is celebrated to mark the **beginning of a new year and the arrival of spring**, symbolizing renewal and positivity.
- People greet each other wishing for a **happy and prosperous year ahead**.
- The festival includes **traditional dances, music performances, and community feasts**.
- Women wear **gold ornaments and elegant traditional dresses**, while men wear **colourful attire**, making the celebration visually vibrant.
- It reflects **gratitude, harmony, and cultural pride** among the Khasi people.

5. Behdienkhlam Festival

- **Behdienkhlam** is a major festival of the **Pnar (Jaintia) community**, celebrated mainly in **Jowai**.
- The main purpose of the festival is to **drive away diseases and evil spirits** and to pray for a **healthy and good harvest**.
- It usually lasts for **several days**, during which families and communities come together in celebration.
- A key attraction is the carrying of **tall decorated bamboo structures (rots)** and dancing in **muddy water**, symbolizing purification.
- A traditional game called **“Datlawakor” (wooden ball game)** is also played as part of the rituals.
- The festival ends with a sense of **joy, unity, and renewed hope** for the future.

6. Wangala Festival

- **Wangala**, also known as the **“Hundred Drums Festival,”** is the most important festival of the **Garo tribe**.
- It is a **harvest festival** celebrated in honour of **Sun God Saljong (Misi Saljong)**, who is believed to bless the crops.
- The festival takes place after the harvest season, especially in **November**, and is marked by **thanksgiving rituals**.
- The highlight is the performance of **traditional dances accompanied by drum beats**, creating a lively atmosphere.
- People wear **bright traditional costumes** and participate in group dances, showing **community spirit and happiness**.
- Wangala reflects the deep connection between the **Garo people, nature, and agriculture**.

7. Strawberry Festival
