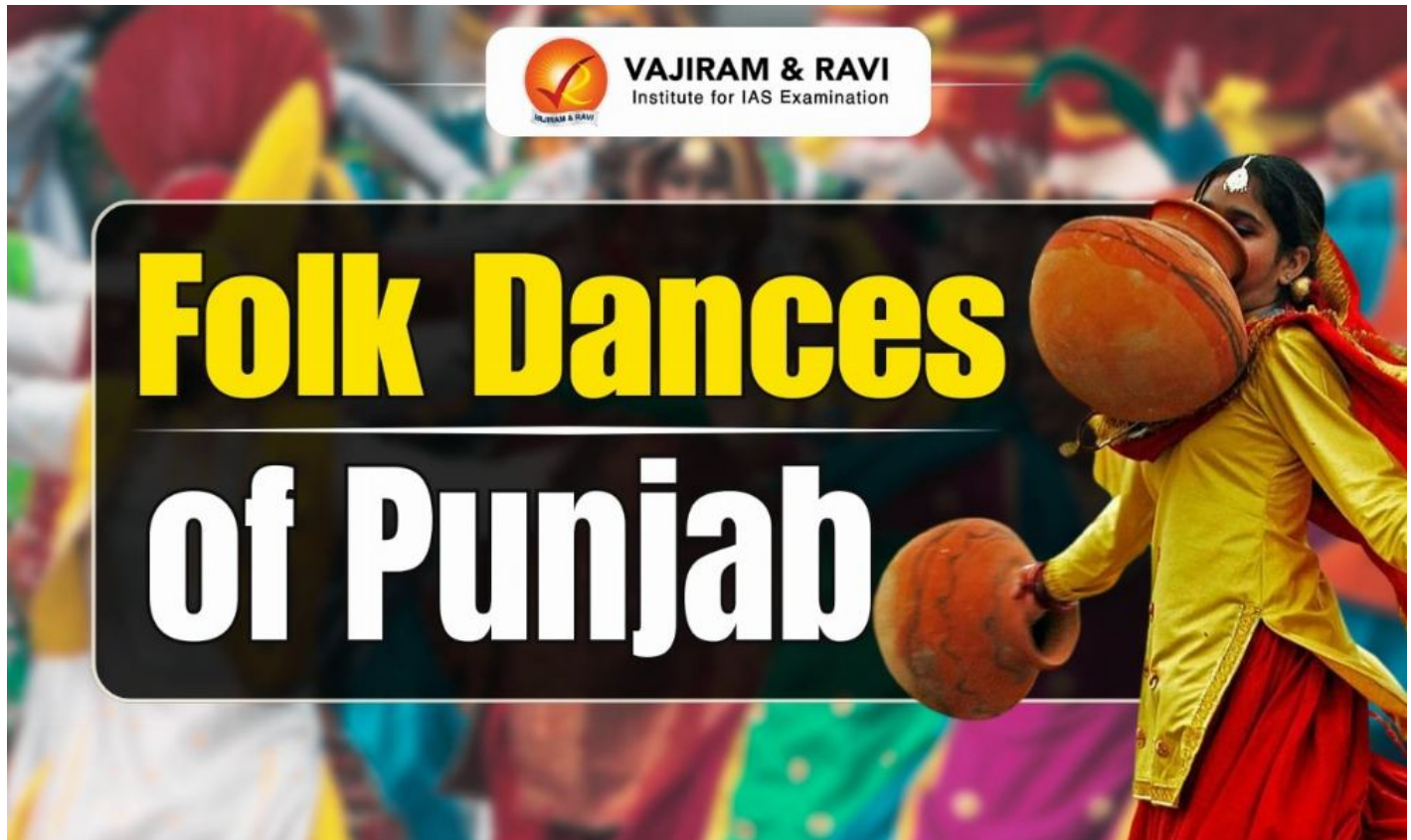


Folk Dances of Punjab, List, Features, and Cultural Significance
