- **Influence of Freedom Movement:** Inspired by **Mahatma Gandhi's Non-Cooperation Movement**, he resigned from his government job in **1921** to devote himself fully to literature, journalism, and social service.
- **Languages of Writing:** Wrote extensively in both **Urdu and Hindi**, making significant contributions to the literary traditions of both languages.
- **Literary Style:** Known for his **simple, realistic, and emotionally engaging writing style**, which made complex social issues accessible to ordinary readers.
