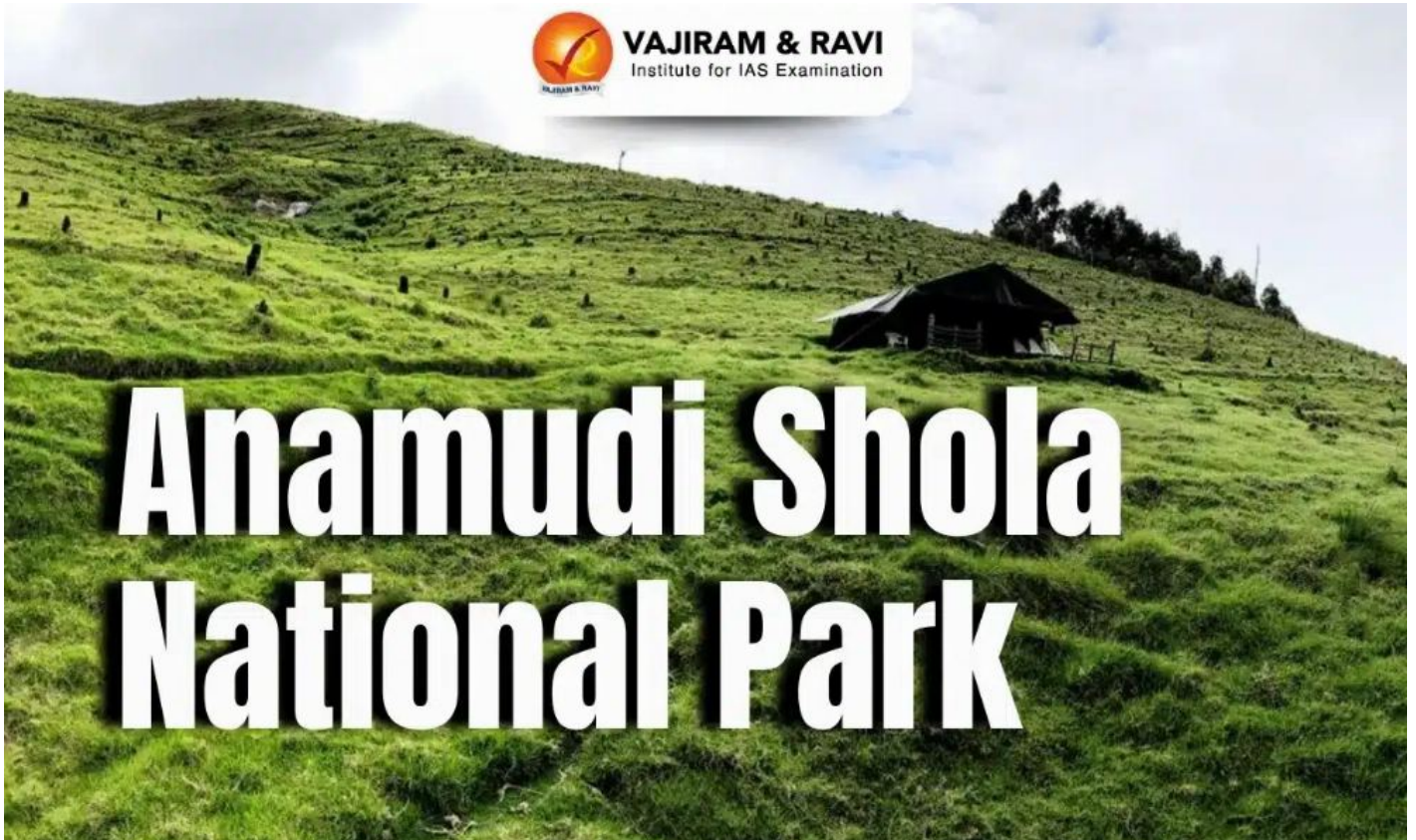


Anamudi Shola National Park, Vegetation, Location, Flora, Fauna

Where is Anamudi Shola National Park Located?

Why is Anamudi Shola National Park Important?

- The park is named after **Anamudi Peak (2,695 meters)**, which is the **highest peak in South India**, giving the region both geographical and ecological significance.
- It plays a crucial role in **watershed management**, as it forms the origin and catchment area for important rivers like the **Pambar and Chinnar**, which support surrounding ecosystems and human settlements.
- Being part of the Western Ghats, the park supports **high levels of endemism**, meaning many plants and animals found here exist nowhere else in the world.
- It also helps in **climate regulation**, maintaining rainfall patterns and supporting overall environmental stability in the region.

What are the Geographical Features of the Park?

- The park is made up of three main forest regions: **Mannavanshola, Idavarashola, and Pullardishola**, which together form a compact but diverse landscape.
- It features **rugged mountains, steep slopes, valleys, and grasslands**, creating a variety of natural habitats within a small area.
- The forests in the park include:
 - **Southern Subtropical Hill Forests**, found at moderate elevations
 - **Southern Montane Wet Temperate Forests**, found in cooler and wetter areas
 - **Moist Deciduous Forests**, found in lower regions
- These varied landscapes allow different species to thrive, making the park **ecologically diverse and balanced**.

What Makes the Shola Forest Ecosystem Unique?

What Type of Flora is Found in the Park?

- Anamudi Shola National Park supports a **wide variety of plant species**, thanks to its cool climate and continuous water supply.
- The park contains around:
 - **174 species of herbs and shrubs**, which form the ground vegetation
 - **62 species of trees**, contributing to forest structure
 - **40 species of climbers**, many of which are rare or endemic
- These plants are important for **providing food and shelter to wildlife**, as well as for **soil conservation, water retention, and climate regulation**.

What Animals are Found in Anamudi Shola National Park?

- The park is home to a **rich variety of wildlife**, including several endangered and endemic species.
- Major mammals include:
 - **Elephants, Tigers, Leopards, and Panthers**, which are top predators and keystone species
 - **Indian Bison (Gaur), Sambar Deer, and Spotted Deer**, which are important herbivores
- It also supports rare species such as:
 - **Nilgiri Tahr and Lion-tailed Macaque**, both endemic to the Western Ghats
 - **Giant Grizzled Squirrel and Flying Squirrel**, which are rarely seen
- Other animals like **Sloth Bear, Hanuman Langur, and civet cats** add to the park's biodiversity, making it a **safe habitat for both large and small species**.
